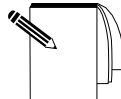
room. Allow at least fifteen minutes' travel time.

- Early voting is available at the Vernon Township building, 16652 W. Buffalo Grove Road in Prairie View, from March 5th through March 17th.
- Early voting is available Monday through Friday between the hours of 9 and 5 and on Saturday between 9 and 2.

Wildlife Alert

Spring is coming, and soon we will once again see ducklings and goslings crossing Inverrary Lane. Please slow down while driving down Inverrary and stop for the few moments it takes for the bird families to cross the road.

Dog Waste

It's delightful to finally see the ground again when the air warms and the snow melts. Sometimes one even finds treasures: a lost mitten, perhaps, or a buried snow shovel. Less lovely by far is it to find a sodden pile of dog waste. Waste that is deposited in the snow does not go anywhere; it will still be there when the snow melts. If you have a dog, you need to pick up after your dog in the winter and in the summer, in the snow and in the rain, whether your dog is large or whether your dog is small. There is no "Poop Fairy" that will do this job for you. It is your responsibility, as a dog owner, to pick up after your pet; failure to do so can and will result in a fine.

Snow Dump Areas

Parking is prohibited in the snow dump areas between November 1 and April 15. This is true whether or not there is snow on the ground or in the forecast. If snow is in the forecast, if at all possible try to avoid parking in front of your garage until the area has been cleaned.

Garage Doors

Please keep your garage door closed unless you are entering or exiting your garage. The garages are unheated and contain water pipes that can freeze and burst. If you leave your garage door open, you will be billed for all charges related to frozen pipes.

Warming Up Your Car

Don't warm up your car in your garage unless you're trying to poison your neighbors, your family, or yourself. Drive your car outside of the garage, close your garage door, and then warm up your car.

- The Township is discussing the elimination of the Township Road District, which maintains and clears the roads. If eliminated, these duties would then be outsourced as necessary. The issue of whether or not to consolidate highway services will be decided by the electorate on a future referendum.
- The railroad had been parking their engines along Juneway, the street at the end of Inverrary. Residents complained about the noise and pollutants, and the railroad has stopped parking their engines there.
- The grand opening of the new Lake County Museum, renamed the Bess Bower Dunn Museum, is set for March 24th. The new home of the museum is in the General Offices of the Lake County Forest Preserve, 1899 Winchester Road, in Libertyville. Your children will love the new museum: it

will contain a lifesize model of a dinosaur and a walk-in Native American wigwam.

Pace Dial-a-Ride

Vernon Township, in conjunction with Pace, operates a 10-passenger bus to provide transportation to all township residents. The bus is equipped with a wheelchair lift and provides room for two wheelchairs. The service operates Monday through Friday between the hours of 8:30 am to 3:30 pm. There is no weekend or holiday service.

The Vernon Township sponsored bus provides service only between the township boundaries. The north boundary is Route 60 (Townline Road; the south boundary is Lake Cook Road. The east boundary runs along the tollway (IL Route 94) and the west boundary is Diamond Lake Road. One way fares are \$2.00 for adults, \$1.00 for seniors over 65 or disabled, \$1.00 for students and children over 7, children under 7 are free when accompanied by a fare paying adult.

Arrangements for pickups must be made at least 24 hours in advance and may be made for reoccurring services. Every effort is made to schedule rides although the Township appreciates your being flexible as our bus is quite popular. The Dial A Ride bus is available to take residents to locations within the township such as doctor and therapy appointments as well as grocery

shopping, general shopping and beauty and barber shops.

If you have a question regarding the pickup area or a drop off location, or would like to make a reservation please phone the township at 847-634-4600.

Take a Bite out of Crime

- If you observe a crime in progress, please call 911 immediately.
- If you notice suspicious activity on the property, especially in the parking lots, please call the Sheriff's Office at 847-377-4000. If you have knowledge of a serious crime or illegal activity that has already occurred or is about to occur at a business or other location, call Lake County Crime Stoppers at 847-662-2222. You will not be asked to identify yourself. Instead, you will be assigned a code number.

If you are thinking of installing a satellite dish, outside lighting, a window or door, a flagpole, or any other attachment to the outside of your unit, on the building, or on the common elements, be sure to call **Customer Service at (847) 459-0000** before adding or making any changes. You will be instructed if you need Board permission. **Improper installations will be removed, and you will not only have to pay the cost of the removal, but you will also incur a fine and be responsible for repairing**

the exterior of the building or common elements.

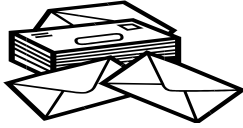

Here are the first things you need to know when recycling curbside in Lake County, IL. Place these items together in your recycling container:

<p style="writing-mode: vertical-rl; transform: rotate(180deg);">METAL</p>		<p>ACCEPTED: All clean and empty aluminum cans, foil and foil pans; steel and tin cans; spray cans and paint cans; kitchen pots, pans and trays; utensils.</p> <p><i>Caps, lids, pull tabs and labels may remain on the containers. Place metal lids inside of empty cans.</i></p>	<p>NOT ACCEPTED: Propane or helium tanks; needles or syringes; electronics, small appliances; batteries; hangers; wire; holiday lights; ammunition; flares; combustible liquids or gases.</p> <p><i>Metal containers and foil should be clean, empty of all liquids and free of food residue.</i></p>
<p style="writing-mode: vertical-rl; transform: rotate(180deg);">PLASTIC</p>		<p>ACCEPTED: All clean and empty plastic household containers, bottles of any size; jugs; tubs; cups; clamshell style containers; reusable food containers; laundry baskets; hangers; buckets; storage totes; kitty litter tubs; plant pots; unmotorized toys; small non inflatable pools.</p> <p><i>Caps, lids, rings, handles and labels should be left on the plastic containers.</i></p>	<p>NOT ACCEPTED: Foam cups; foam cartons; foam packaging material; plastic bags; plastic wrap; plastic utensils and garden hoses.</p> <p><i>Plastic containers should be clean, empty of all liquids and free of food residue.</i></p>
		<p>Clean and empty plastic bags and wrappers should be stuffed into one bag and tied closed. Recycle them at your nearest participating grocery or retail store. Do not place plastic bags and wrap in your recycling container. For more info go to filmrecycling.org</p>	
		<p>Include grocery bags; newspaper bags; bread bags; produce bags; zip lock bags; toilet paper, napkin and paper towel wraps; case wrap; diaper wrap; dry cleaning bags; plastic retail bags; bubble wrap; electronic wrap; furniture wrap; tyvek and other plastic shipping envelopes.</p>	
		<p>DO NOT include frozen food bags, prewashed salad bags, bio-based, degradable or compostable bags.</p>	
			
<p style="writing-mode: vertical-rl; transform: rotate(180deg);">PAPER</p>		<p>ACCEPTED: Scrap paper; mail; envelopes, including window; copy paper; office paper; shredded paper; cards; cardboard boxes; cereal & frozen food boxes; newspaper; ads; inserts; catalogs; magazines; phone books; hardcover and soft cover books; paper egg cartons; paper cups; milk, juice and other paper beverage cartons; paper tubes; wrapping paper.</p> <p><i>Shredded paper should be bagged.</i></p> <p><i>Cardboard boxes should be flattened and must be cut down to pieces no larger than 3'x 3'.</i></p>	<p>NOT ACCEPTED: Plastic bags, plastic wrap and straws; corrugated cardboard that contains food residue or wax-coating; paper towels; napkins; facial tissue; photos; laminated paper or paper coated with food, wax or foil.</p> <p><i>Paper boxes and cartons should be clean, empty and free of all liquid, food residue or packing materials.</i></p>
<p style="writing-mode: vertical-rl; transform: rotate(180deg);">GLASS</p>		<p>ACCEPTED: Clean and empty glass bottles and jars, all colors.</p> <p><i>Remove all caps and lids.</i></p>	<p>NOT ACCEPTED: Light bulbs; drink glasses; ceramics; bakeware; mirrors; ornamental glass; window and auto glass.</p> <p><i>Glass containers should be clean, empty of all liquids and free of food residue.</i></p>
